DELEGATE TOTALS AND DATES FOR PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARIES AND CAUCUSES, 1988

This report provides the 1988 Democratic and Republican Presidential primary and caucus dates and the delegate totals for each party for the States and Territories. The dates for primaries and caucuses are determined by the State Legislature or the State Party.

Delegate totals for the States and Territories are determined by the Democratic National Committee and the Republican National Committee, respectively. While the Democratic delegate totals have received final approval, slight changes could occur as a result of changes in membership in the Democratic National Committee, the Democratic membership in Congress, or the number of Democratic Governors. The delegate totals are final for the Republicans as well.

Table 1 presents this information alphabetically, by State. Table 2 arranges it chronologically, by date of the primary or caucus. Table 3 includes information only on Democratic primaries and caucuses, arranged in State order, while Table 4 presents information, similarly arranged, just on Republican events.

Sources consulted for this report include: Final Call for the 1988 Democratic National Convention and 1988 Republican National Convention: Tentative Allocation for Delegates for each parties' delegate totals. Other information was gathered through a telephone survey of State Election officials, and in some cases, the State parties.
