## Black Members of the United States Congress: 1789-2001

## Summary

Thirty-nine black Members serve in the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress, all in the House of Representatives. In 210 years of congressional history, there have been 107 black Members of Congress: 103 elected to the House and four to the Senate.

The first black Member of Congress was Hiram Rhodes Revels (R-MS) who served in the Senate in the 41<sup>st</sup> Congress (1870). The first black Member of the House was Joseph H. Rainey (R-SC). He also served in the 41<sup>st</sup> Congress. Shirley Chisholm (D-NY), elected to the 91<sup>st</sup> through 97<sup>th</sup> Congresses (1969-1983), was the first black woman in Congress. Since that time, 20 other black women have been elected, including Senator CarolMoseley-Braun (D-IL, 1993-1999), who was the first black woman, as well as first black Democrat, elected to the Senate.

The majority of the black Members have been Democrats. There have been 80 black Democrats and 27 black Republicans.

The black Members of Congress have served on all major committees. Sixteen have served as committee chairmen, 15 in the House and one in the Senate.

# Black Members of the United States Congress: 1789-2001

## Introduction

In 210 years of congressional history, 107 black Americans have been elected to the U.S. Congress: 103 to the House and four to the Senate.<sup>1</sup> Of these, 21 have been women. Thirty-nine black Members serve in the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress, all in the House of Representatives. There were 39 black Members of the 106<sup>th</sup> Congress, all in the House; 40 in the 105<sup>th</sup> Congress, 39 in the House and one in the Senate; and a record number of 41 in the 104<sup>th</sup> Congress: 40 in the House and one in the Senate.<sup>2</sup>

The largest number of black Members elected as freshmen was 17 in the 103<sup>rd</sup> Congress. Sixteen were elected to the House and one, Carol Moseley-Braun (D-IL, 1993-1999), was elected to the Senate. Senator Moseley-Braun was also the first black woman and black Democrat to serve in the Senate.

The first black Member of Congress was Hiram Rhodes Revels (R-MS) who served in the Senate in the 41<sup>st</sup> Congress (1870). He also has the distinction of being the first black Member of the Senate and the first black Member of Congress from Mississippi. Joseph H. Rainey (R-SC) was the first black Member of the House of Representatives. He also served in the 41<sup>st</sup> Congress. Shirley Chisholm (D-NY), elected to the 91<sup>st</sup> through the 97<sup>th</sup> Congresses (1969-83), was the first black woman to serve in Congress. Edward Brooke (R-MA) was the first black person elected to the Senate after the passage of the Twelfth Amendment which provided for the direct election of Senators. He served in the 90<sup>th</sup> through the 95<sup>th</sup> Congresses (1967-1979).

The majority of the black Members of Congress have been Democrats. There have been 80 black Democrats and 27 black Republicans. All of the black Democrats have been elected in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. There have been five black Republicans elected to Congress in this century, four in the House and one in the Senate.

Representative Mel Reynolds (D-IL) resigned in October 1995, and was replaced by Representative Jesse Jackson, Jr. (D-IL); Representative Walter Tucker (D-CA) resigned in December 1995 and was replaced by Representative Juanita Millender-McDonald (D-CA); and Representative Kweisi Mfume (D-MD) resigned in February 1996 and was replaced by Representative Elijah Cummings (D-MD).

John Conyers, Jr. (D-MI) holds the record for longevity of service by a black Member (36 years). He was first elected to the 89<sup>th</sup> Congress and has served since January 3, 1965.

A record number of 15 black women serve in the House in the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress. A total of 22 black women have served in Congress. The first was Representative Shirley Chisholm (D-NY, 1969-1983). Senator Carol Moseley-Braun (D-IL, 1993-1999) is only black woman to have served in the Senate. The black female Members of the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress include Representatives Maxine Waters (D-CA), Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC), Carrie Meek (D-FL), Corinne Brown (D-FL), Cynthia McKinney (D-FL), Eva Clayton (D-NC), Eddie Bernice Johnson (D-TX), Sheila Jackson Lee (D-TX), Barbara Lee (D-CA), Juanita Millender-McDonald (D-CA), Julia Carson (D-IN), Carolyn Cheeks Kilpatrick (D-MI), Donna Christian-Christiensen (D-VI), Stephanie Tubbs Jones (D-OH), and Diane Watson (D-CA). Other black women Members were Cardiss Collins (D-IL, 1973-1997), Barbara-Rose Collins (D-MI, 1991-1997), Yvonne Brathwaite Burke (D-CA, 1973-1979), Katie Hall (D-IN, 1982-1985), and Barbara Jordan (D-TX, 1973-1979).

Two incumbent black Members are the sons of former Members: Representative Harold Ford, Jr. (D-TN, 1997-), the son of former Representative Harold Ford Sr. (D-TN, 1975-1997), and Representative Wm. Lacy Clay (D-MO, 2001-), the son of Representative William L. Clay, Sr. (D-MO, 1969-2001). One former black Member, Representative Cardiss Collins (D-IL, 1973-1997) was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of her husband, Representative George Collins (D-IL, 1970-1972). Representative George White (R-NC, 1897-1901) was the brother-in-law of Representative Henry Cheatham (R-NC, 1889-1893).

In addition to Cardiss Collins, 17 other black Members were first elected to fill vacancies in the House. These include Representatives George Collins (D-IL), Eva Clayton (NC), Katie Hall (D-IN), Robert Nix, Sr. (D-PA); Charles Hayes (D-IL), Bennett Stewart (D-IL), George W. Crockett, Jr. (D-MI), Lucien Blackwell (D-PA), Edolphus Towns (D-NY), Jesse Jackson, Jr. (D-IL), Elijah Cummings (D-MD), Barbara Lee (D-CA), Craig Washington (D-TX), Bennie Thompson (D-MS), Alton Waldon, Jr. (D-NY), Gregory Meeks (D-NY), Juanita Millender-McDonald (D-CA), and Diane Watson (D-CA). All but Representatives Stewart, Walden, and Watson have been subsequently elected to additional terms.<sup>3</sup>

The black Members of the Congress have served on all major committees. Fifteen, all Representatives, have chaired congressional committees. These include Representatives Yvonne B. Burke (D-CA, 1973-1979), William L. Clay (D-MO, 1969-2001), John Conyers, Jr. (D-MI, 1965-), William L. Dawson (D-IL, 1943-1970), Ronald V. Dellums (D-CA, 1971-1998), Charles C. Diggs, Jr. (D-MI, 1955-1980), Julian Dixon (D-CA, 1979-), William H. Gray, III (D-PA, 1979-1991), Augustus F. Hawkins (D-CA, 1963-1991), George T. (Mickey) Leland (D-TX, 1979-1989), Parren J. Mitchell (D-MD, 1971-1987), Robert N.C. Nix, Sr. (D-PA, 1958-1979), Adam Clayton Powell (D-NY, 1945-1967, 1969-1971), Charles B. Rangel (D-NY, 1971-), and Louis Stokes (D-OH, 1969-1999).

This report provides information on black Members of Congress including the dates they were first elected, the Congresses in which they served, the committees on which they served, and, where relevant, an indication of the committees they have chaired. In addition, four tables summarize information about black Members. Tables 1 and 2 list selected data about each black Member. Table 3 presents the number and names of black Members by Congress. Table 4 presents the same information by state. Table 5 shows the changing number of black Members serving in Congress since 1870, when the first black Member was elected.

Most of the data presented are from the *Biographical Directory of the American* Congress, 1774-1996 [http://bioguide.congress.gov]; various editions of the *Congressional Directory*; a broad range of *Congressional Quarterly* publications; and the Congressional Yellowbook, Winter 2001, published by Leadership Directories, Inc. Information on the committee assignments of the black Members in the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress was obtained from various editions of the Congressional Record; calls to some Members' offices; and List of Standing Committees and Select Committees and Their Subcommittees of the House of Representatives Together with the Joint Committees of the Congress with an Alphabetical List of Members and Their Committee Assignments, One Hundred Seventh Congress, prepared under the direction of Jeff Trandahl, Clerk of the House of Representatives, April 30, 2001 [http://clerkweb.house.gov/107/oal/.php3mbrcmtee/mbrcmtee/htm]. House committee assignments for the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress reflect the name change of two Committees. The Banking and Financial Services Committee was renamed the Financial Services Committee, and the Commerce Committee was renamed the Energy and Commerce Committee. House committee assignments for the 106<sup>th</sup> Congress reflect the name change of the Committee on House Oversight back to the Committee on House Administration, the Committee on National Security back to the Committee on Armed Services, and the Committee on Government Reform and Oversight to the Committee on Government Reform.
